Our sin was put to death as he died.



"For by grace you have been saved through faith; and this is not of yourselves, it is the gift of God; not a result of works, so that no one may boast." Ephesians 2:8-9


When you believe Jesus and trust him, you take steps to cross the bridge.

Believe: Believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the living God, who died to rescue you from your sins. John 3:16-18

Confess: You are able to say that you believe in Jesus and express his true identity as Son of God, Savior, and Lord. Matthew 10:32; 16:16; Romans 10:9-10

Turn: Since Jesus is rescuing you from your old sinful ways, you turn from that way of life to the new life Jesus has for you. Luke 13:3; Acts 2:38; 2 Peter 3:9

Be Immersed: As an act of faith, we are immersed into water and raised back up by a follower of Jesus. This joins us with Jesus in his death, burial, and resurrection. As the water washes away literal dirt, the Spirit cleanses us of our sins. Our sins are gone and we become living temples of the Holy Spirit. Acts 2:38-39; 1 Peter 3:18-22; Romans 6:1-5; Galatians 3:26-27; Colossians 2:11-12; Acts 22:16



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What Kind of Church Is This?

What does it mean to be a "Christian Church?" We are a part of the Restoration Movement, a brotherhood of independent churches that are committed to restoring the church of the New Testament. A simple way to describe what it means to be a Christian Church/Church of Christ is the following formula:

Biblical Authority + Church Unity -> Global Disciple-Making

The Restoration Movement affirms Biblical authority, the Reformation principle of Sola Scriptura, tied to significant commitment to church unity, beyond the level of unity by agreement, all for the sake of making disciples around the world.

First, our movement affirms the authority of Scripture above everything else, such as creeds or councils or any human authority. Candidly, we can make use of tools to guide or aid us in our understanding of the Scriptures (councils, creeds, etc.), but they are not a substitute or rival to the Bible. As one of our guiding principles expresses, "No book but the Bible, no creed but Christ" and "Where the Bible speaks, we speak; where the Bible is silent, we are silent." Scripture is the common theological denominator for all denominations, and the Restoration Movement focused on it for the sake of unity.

Our second affirmation is Church Unity. We have a tendency to underestimate this feature of our Movement. "Of course we'd unite with other believers who agree with us." Anyone can say that. In fact, this idea of unity is less than ideal! If it is by agreement, then it becomes highly conditional. This affirmation is more than a contract where we agree to all the conditions and sign on the dotted line. Is that the basis for church unity? When we explore the history of our Movement, we can see that even Alexander Campbell and Barton W. Stone had sharp disagreements on matters of interpretation, doctrine, and even church governance; but they remained united due to their

common commitment to Christ and Scripture; recognizing that unity in Christ can and should override many points of division present in the church of their day - as it should for us today. "In essentials, unity; in opinion, liberty; but in all things, love" became one of our most challenging principles to fully embrace and embody, but it has served us well as we stayed focus on disciple-making.

Third, our ultimate aim is global disciple-making. The inevitable result of a unity in the bonds of Christian love and the embracing of Scripture as our common core authority led to our Movement embracing Jesus' final charge to us as his followers: "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age" (NIV Matthew 28:18-20). When the church is divided, and its message is skewed, then its focus on the prime directive of making disciples is lost. A unified church with a simple, singular message would be far more effective at reaching nonbelievers than every denomination with varied, nuanced messages engaging in evangelism and equipping. Hence, "We are Christians only, not the only Christians" would be the result of our endeavors. Campbell and Stone both saw this as the ultimate aim of the church, one being hampered by the fragmentation within the body of Christ.

Distinctives of the Restoration Movement

The Restoration Movement elevates the teachings of Jesus Christ and the Bible over human traditions and teachings. One needs to accept Christ alone, and not the teachings of others to become a Christian.

No Creed but Christ. No book but the Bible.

Each church is governed by their own eldership. There is not an outside governing body. The Restoration Movement was founded by a group of ministers that believed the best practice and example for structuring the church is found in the Bible itself. There are several sayings within the Restoration Movement that remind us of this vision:

- 1) Where the Bible speaks, we speak. Where the Bible is silent, we are silent. There are many areas of Christianity that are open to each believer's good judgment. Such issues as church music or church service styles can be very controversial, and yet they are often about mere personal preference. Where the Bible specifically teaches believers how to live and believe, we affirm these teachings. Where the Bible does not specifically endorse or condemn a practice, we use general biblical principles to inform our decisions.
- 2) We do Bible things in Bible ways. We use Scripture to shape our church structure. This includes things like weekly communion and baptism by immersion. As we look through the pages of Scripture, We see that the early believers had communion each week in Acts 2:42 and 20:7. We also see that baptism in the New Testament was always by immersion. It is our desire to stay true to the pages of Scripture, so in these and other practices, we carry them out as they are modeled for us in the Bible.
- 3) In matters of Faith: Unity; In matters of Opinion: Liberty; In all things: Love. We uphold the core teachings of Scripture that lead us to faith in Jesus the Christ, and are unified that these beliefs are central to our faith. However, there are many matters that are not specifically addressed in Scripture. We allow liberty in these areas of opinion, trusting that each believer will use their sound judgment and general biblical principles to inform their choices. But in everything we do, we show love to our fellow believers (1 John 2:10, 4:20-21).
